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To support over 42,000 artisans in traditional crafts

Minister, MSME inaugurates 50 SFURTI clusters in 18 States



On 22nd February, 2021: Union Minister for MSME & Road Transport & Highways, Shri Nitin Gadkari inaugurated 50 artisan-based SFURTI clusters, spread over 18 States.

In the 50 clusters inaugurated on 22nd February, 2021, over 42,000 artisans have been supported in the traditional segments of muslin, khadi, coir, handicraft, handlooms, wood craft, leather, pottery, carpet weaving, bamboo, agro processing, tea, etc. The Ministry of MSME, Govt. of India has funded an amount of around Rs.85 crore for development of these 50 clusters. The Ministry of MSME is implementing a Scheme of Fund for Regeneration of Traditional Industries (SFURTI) with a view to organize traditional industries and artisans into clusters to make them competitive and increase their income.

Inaugurating the clusters, Shri Gadkari said more research needs to be done on what kind of village products are required by the consumers, and how to attractively design and market these products. He suggested that the National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad may be approached to improve the design and attractiveness of traditional products. A web portal

is also required, on the lines of Amazon or Alibaba, to market these products effectively, both in India and abroad, he added.

The Minister also pointed out the need to step up the pace of formation of such clusters, since only 82 of the





371 announced so far are actually functional, and said a target of 5,000 clusters is easily achievable if red-tape can be reduced.

The clusters were inaugurated in presence of Minister of State, MSME, Shri Pratap Chandra Sarangi, Secretary MSME, Shri B.B. Swain, Members of Parliament, local MLAs, and senior officers of the Ministry of MSME.

Minister of State, MSME, Sh. Sarangi said formation of the clusters builds the confidence of traditional craftsmen, and it is part of the government's strategy of keeping villages at the core of the economic policy.

These clusters have been inaugurated in the States of Andhra Pradesh, Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Chhattisgarh, Gujarat, Haryana, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Manipur, Nagaland, Odisha, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal

Background

As on date, there are 371 numbers of Clusters which have are being funded by the Ministry, supporting 2.18 lakh artisans with a total Government assistance of Rs. 888 cr. More than Rs.708 crore has been the budgetary allocation under the scheme, of which more than Rs.567 crore has been released for the implementation of the scheme so far. These clusters are spread all over the country covering 248 districts. The Ministry aims to support at least 1 cluster in each district in the coming period.

SFURTI clusters are of two types i.e., Regular Cluster (500 artisans) with Government assistance of up to Rs.2.5 crore and Major Cluster (more than 500 artisans) with Government assistance up to Rs.5 crore. The artisans are organized into SPVs which can be (i) a Society registered under Societies (Registration) Act, 1860, (ii) a Co-operative Society under an appropriate statute, (iii) a Producer Company under Section 465 (1) of Companies Act, 2013 (18 of 2013), (iv) a Section 8 Company under the Companies Act, 2013 (18 of 2013) or (v) a Trust.

Under the Scheme, the Ministry supports various interventions including setting up of infrastructure through Common Facility Centers (CFCs), procurement of new machineries, creating raw material banks, design intervention, improved packaging, improvement of marketing Infrastructure, improved skills and capacity development through training and exposure visits, etc. Besides, the scheme focuses on strengthening the cluster governance systems with the active participation of the stakeholders, so that they are able to gauge the emerging challenges and opportunities and respond to them through building innovative and traditional skills, improved technologies, advanced processes, market intelligence and new models of public-private partnerships, so as to gradually replicate similar models of cluster- based traditional Industries.

Presently various sectors covered under the scheme and the number of clusters are as follows:

Big Boost to "Aatmanirbhar Bharat" & "Waste to Wealth"

Shri Nitin Gadkari Inaugurated Agarbatti Stick Making Unit in Assam



Sustained efforts of Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) to strengthen Indian Agarbatti industry have begun yielding results with Assam leading the way.

On 18th February, 2021 Hon'ble Minister of MSME, Shri Nitin Gadkari through video conference inaugurated a major Bamboo Agarbatti Stick making unit named "Keshari Bio Products LLP" at Bajali district in Assam. Hon'ble Chief Minister of Assam, Shri Sarbananda Sonowal and KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena were present on the occasion.

The unit is a major step in the direction of "Aatmanirbhar Bharat" and an apt example of "Waste to Wealth" as apart from making Agarbatti sticks, it utilizes a huge quantity of waste bamboo into making bio-fuel and various other products. Set up at a cost of Rs 10 crore, the Agarbatti stick unit will provide direct employment to 350 people while also creating over 300 indirect employment.

Setting up of these units in Assam assumes great

significance in wake of the Modi government's decision of restriction on import of raw agarbatti from China and Vietnam and also a hike in import duty on round bamboo sticks for agarbatti. The two decisions were taken essentially to curb the huge import of agarbatti and bamboo sticks from the two countries that had crippled the Indian agarbatti industries.

Shri Gadkari and the KVIC Chairman Vinai Saxena had made great efforts to curb the import of these two commodities. As a result, hundreds of closed Agarbatti manufacturing units in India were revived in the last one and half years creating nearly 3 lakh new jobs. Keshari Bio Products LLP is the first big project that has come up after these policy decisions.

Shri Gadkari expressed happiness over the new bamboo





The Hon'ble Chief Minister also praised the initiative saying this manufacturing unit would create new employment avenues in the entire state.

The KVIC Chairman Saxena said the import restriction on raw agarbatti and hike in import duty on bamboo agarbatti sticks created a huge employment opportunity in India and these new units aim at capitalizing on the opportunity. "Agarbatti industry is a key vertical of India's village industry which employs more than 10 lakh artisans. With new Agarbatti and bamboo stick making units coming up, nearly 3 lakh new jobs have been created in this segment in the last one and half years. To reap maximum benefit from this opportunity, KVIC has also launched a program called Khadi Agarbatti Aatmanirbhar Mission to increase India's local Agarbatti production through the Prime Minister Employment Generation Program," Saxena said. He added that the new agarbatti stick making unit will also strengthen the huge bamboo-based industry in Assam.

It is noteworthy that only 16% of bamboo is used for making Agarbatti sticks while the remaining 84% bamboo goes waste. However, with diverse technology employed by Keshari Bio Products LLP, every bit of the bamboo is utilized. The waste bamboo is burnt to produce methane gas which is mixed with diesel as an alternate fuel. The burnt bamboo is also used for making charcoal powder for Agarbatti and fuel briquettes. The waste bamboo is also used for making ice-cream sticks, chopsticks, spoons and other items.

At present, the consumption of incense sticks in India is pegged at a whopping 1490 tons per day but only 760 tons per day is locally produced. Hence, the huge gap between the demand and supply resulted in heavy import of raw agarbatti. Consequently, the import of raw agarbatti increased from just 2% in 2009 to 80% in 2019.

People Patronize Monpa Handmade Paper of Tawang after PM's push in <mark>Mann ki Baat</mark>



The sale of the 1000-years old heritage Monpa handmade paper or "Mon Shugu" is quickly catching pace, thanks to its special mention by Hon'ble Prime Minister in his radio program Mann ki Baat. Khadi and Village Industries Commission, which revived this ancient art at Tawang in Arunachal Pradesh on 25th December 2020, has made Monpa Handmade paper a vailable online through its e-portal www.khadiindia.gov.in.

3rd February, 2021: On the first day of its launch, more than 100 sheets of Monpa Handmade paper were sold. The orders were received from Maharashtra and Uttar Pradesh. The handmade paper, handcrafted by trained local artisans in Tawang, was put to online sale on Sunday (January 31) after the Prime Minister spoke about this ancient art. Monpa Handmade Paper is not only supporting environment protection but has also opened new avenues of income for the local artisans.

The handmade paper sheet measuring 24 inch in length and 16 inch in width is priced economically at Rs 50 per sheet.

KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena said owing to its religious and cultural significance, Monpa Handmade Paper had great market potential in India and abroad. "On the first day of its online sale, we received orders for over 100 sheets. The Hon'ble Prime Minister's appeal will definitely make this paper popular among people. We will explore new market avenues for Monpa Handmade paper that will strengthen this industry and local artisans in Arunachal Pradesh," Saxena said.

Revival of this art assumes significance as Monpa Handmade paper was once produced in every household in Tawang and the paper was exported to many countries like Tibet, Bhutan, Myanmar and Japan among others. However, with the new technologies coming in, the handmade paper industry almost disappeared in the last 100 years.

Notably, Monpa Handmade paper is made from the bark of tree Shugu Sheng grown locally in Tawang and is identified by its distinctive translucent fibrous texture. The paper is weightless but its natural fibers add great tensile strength to this paper making it apt for various art works. Monpa handmade paper has been used for writing Buddhist scriptures, manuscripts and for making prayer flags. Writing on this paper is also known to be tamper-proof. The Monpa Handmade paper industry set up in Tawang aims at engaging the local youths with this art professionally and earn.

Initially, the paper unit has engaged 9 artisans who can produce 500 to 600 sheets of Monpa handmade paper per day. The artisans will be earning wages of per day Rs 400 per day. To begin with, 12 women and 2 men from local villages have been trained to make Monpa handmade paper.



KVIC Revives Assam's Historic Khadi Institution destroyed during Militancy 32 Years ago



On 14.02.21: Life has come a full circle for one of Assam's oldest Khadi Institutions in a span of 56 years. Inaugurated by the great Jai Prakash Narayan in 1964 and destroyed by Bodo militants in 1989, the Khadi workshed at village Kawali in Baksa district of Assam has returned to life with spinning and weaving activities and direct employment to 60 families, thanks to Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) which revived the workshed and distributed charkhas and looms. The revived group workshed was inaugurated by KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena on 14th February, 2021. The institution remained in a vandalized state, bearing the scars of Bodo insurgency, for nearly 32 years.





The revival of this workshed is a historic feat for the entire state as it caters to people of multiple ethnic groups like Boro, Mising, Assamese and Bengalis among others. This center has started operations with spinning, weaving and reeling activities of elegant Eri Silk of Assam and other cotton fabric and later on various other Khadi activities like manufacturing of village industry products likes kacchi ghani mustard oil etc.

The KVIC Chairman said another 100 charkha, looms and other equipment will be provided to the local artisans that will not only strengthen this Khadi institution but also empower the local artisans through self-employment and sustainable income. "Revival of this Khadi workshed is historical. KVIC will ensure all infrastructure support to strengthen this unit and very soon this will become a major employment creator for the local artisans in the area. In the next few months,





this center will provide direct employment to nearly 200 more artisan families. This initiative is aligned with Khadi's mantra of "rural resurgence" which also coincides with the Hon'ble Prime Minister's vision - Sabka Sath, Sabka Vikas," Saxena said.

The workshed was constructed by a Khadi institution called Tamulpur Anchalik Gramdan Sangh which shifted to Assam from Arunachal Pradesh following the Chinese aggression in 1962. It began operations with mustard oil production and by the year 1970, spinning and weaving activities also started there providing livelihood to hundreds of artisan families. However, tragedy struck when the institution was burnt down by extremists in 1989 and it remained defunct since then.

This Khadi workshed in Kawali village, located 130 km from Guwahati, lies in a difficult terrain and can be reached only by crossing over river Matanga as there is no bridge over the river till date. The river remains flooded during the monsoon. The workshed has been refurbished with financial assistance from KVIC. The idea behind the workshed scheme is to provide better working conditions to the Khadi artisans that will ultimately improve their productivity.



Gadkari calls for innovative policy-making and transformative change in villages and rural areas



Union Minister for MSME and Road Transport & Highways, Shri Nitin Gadkari has called for lasting and transformative change at the village level, through innovative, research-based technology specially adapted for rural areas.

Addressing a workshop on 06 Feb, 2021 at the Mahatma Gandhi International Hindi University at Wardha in Maharashtra, the Minister pointed out that Village Industries and Khadi generate as much as Rs. 88,000 crores on an annual basis. This can be increased if policy is flexible, and innovative, and is aimed at improving the life of people living in villages. The Minister also stressed that goods produced by village industries can be sold better if they are marketed better.

Recalling the philosophy of Mahatma Gandh, Vinobha Bhave, Pandit Deendayal Upadhyaya, Ram Manohar Lohia and Jayaprakash Narayan, he said that their aim was the same – to improve the lives of the poor living in villages. Unless solutions are found to ensure that

employment is generated in the villages, and they are clean and have enough facilities, the dreams of these leaders will not be fulfilled, he said. Migration of as much as 30% of the country's population from rural areas took place since independence due to lack of growth of the village economy, the Minister said.`

Pointing out that MSMEs contribute 30% of the GDP of India, and there are 6.5 crore units, Sh. Gadkari said the government's aim is to increase the contribution to 40% of GDP, so that rural poor are benefited. Policy has to be made which will empower the poor, he emphasised. The Minister said "We are not in favour of westernization, but we are in favour of modernization, in the villages. This is the time for socio-economic transformation"







Khadi Prakritik Paint

from Cow Dung Gains Ground; KVIC Plans 500 New Plants in 6 Months under PMEGP

The innovative Khadi Prakritik Paint made from cow dung is swiftly gaining ground and set to propel a massive employment surge across the country.

To enable maximum people to benefit from this innovation, KVIC has included this project under the Prime Minister Employment Generation Program (PMEGP), a flagship scheme of the Central government for employment generation. Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) has fixed a target of setting up at least 500 manufacturing units of Prakritik Paint in rural areas, through prospective entrepreneurs, in next six months.

In just one month of its launch, 5000 liter (approx) of Khadi Prakritik Paint has been sold and 275 prospective entrepreneurs have registered with Kumarappa National Handmade Paper Institute (KNHPI) for training in making cow dung paint. While 84 applicants have already been trained; training of the remaining candidate will be completed by March 31. Khadi Prakritik Paint was launched by Hon'ble MSME Minister Shri Nitin Gadkari on 12th January 2021. KNHPI, a unit of KVIC which has developed the paint, is providing 5-day training to applicants in making Prakritik Paint.

KVIC will be setting up another 6 Khadi Prakritik Paint manufacturing units in New Delhi, Varanasi, Ahmedabad, Nashik, Bengaluru and Choudwar in Orissa to maintain supplies. KVIC will soon offer dealerships for Prakritik Paint that will benefit the traders.

KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena expressing his views on 12th March 2021 said the new Khadi Prakritik paint plants will accelerate the rural employment generation in the country. "At least 6000 direct employment will be created with the setting up of the 500 new paint manufacturing plants. While this will significantly increase farmers' income; it will also open



new business avenues like manufacturing and sale of paint-manufacturing machines. This will comprehensively contribute to strengthening local production and help realize the Hon'ble Prime Minister's dream of Aatmanirbhar Bharat," Saxena said. Setting up of 500 Prakritik Paint manufacturing units will require an investment of Rs 100 crore (approx) at the rate of Rs 19 lakh (approx) for each plant. Out of this amount, machinery like Double Disc Refinery, Twin Shaft Machine, Blender, Pug Mill, etc. account for Rs 60 crore (approx). This will, therefore, also boost the machine making industry. At the same time, 500 paint manufacturing units of the capacity of 500 liter per day will be able to produce nearly 7.5 crore liter of Prakritik Paint annually. While this will consume approx. 2.25 crore kg or 22,500 MT of cow dung; it will generate an additional income of Rs. 11.25 crore (approx) to farmers and gaushalas across the country and thus adding to their financial sustainability.



KVIC Supplies Khadi Silk Sarees to Delhi Police

Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) has supplied 850 exquisite Khadi Silk Sarees to Delhi Police. The Sarees will be worn by women front desk executives of the Delhi police force at its various offices.

The consignment worth over Rs 25 lakh has been delivered to Delhi Police in less than 2 months from receiving the purchase order. The dual-tone sarees are made of high quality Tasar-Katia Silk. The sarees have been woven by traditional artisans in West Bengal who specialize in making Tasar - Katia Silk. The sample of the saree was provided by Delhi Police which was accordingly developed by KVIC and approved by Delhi Police. The sarees have a mix of natural color Tasar Silk and Katia Silk in pink color.

Tasar- Katia Silk is a dual-tone fabric made with a blend of Tussar and Katia silk. It is identified by its thick and heavy texture created by using two different threads of Tasar and Katia. Its rugged and rustic appearance but porous weave makes this fabric perfect to wear in all weather.

KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena said the purchase order by Delhi Police manifests Khadi's growing acceptance in various government agencies. "Khadi is a trendsetter. Use of Khadi in our forces will significantly add to its popularity among masses. At the same time, such prestigious orders are a big boost for Khadi artisans," Saxena said, adding the supply of Sarees was accorded high priority and the consignment was delivered within time. "These Sarees will be worn by



women front desk executives of Delhi Police who deal with the general public on a daily basis. This will further enhance Khadi's visibility," Saxena said.

Earlier, KVIC entered into agreements with Indian Railways, Health Ministry, Indian Postal department, Air India and other government agencies for supplying Khadi products including bedsheets and uniforms. KVIC has been preparing uniforms for the crew members and staff of national carrier Air India. Khadi India has also designed and prepared uniforms for over 90,000 postman/postwoman in the country which is now also available online too.

On Bapus Martyr's Day, KVIC Empowers 1650 Khadi Artisans in Murshidabad, West Bengal



When the whole country was paying homage to Mahatma Gandhi on 73rd Martyr's Day, Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) were empowering rural artisans in West Bengal. On 30th January, 2021 as many as 1650 artisan families in West Bengal's Murshidabad took a stride towards self-sustainability by associating with various self-employment schemes of Khadi, which Bapu propagated throughout his life.

KVIC Chairman Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena distributed 825 new model charkhas, 50 silk charkhas, 235 modern looms, 120 Reeling Basins and 95 readymade garment machines to artisans engaged with Khadi spinning and weaving activities. KVIC Chairman also distributed 80 electric potter wheels and other equipment to marginalized potters in Murshidabad under the flagship Kumhar Sashaktikaran Yojana of KVIC.

Distribution of charkha, looms and sewing machines aims at strengthening the local Cotton and Silk industry in Murshidabad which has a glorious history of producing exquisite fabric like Muslin Cotton and Mulberry and Tussar Silk. KVIC has disbursed Rs 20 crore to strengthen 23 Khadi





Institutions engaged with production of khadi in Murshidabad. The development comes a day after KVIC's massive employment drive in Malda where 2250 beneficiaries were distributed advanced tools. The employment activities rolled out in West Bengal will boost the Hon'ble Prime minister's call for "Aatmanirbhar Bharat" and "Vocal for Local".

Distribution of electric potter wheels also aims at empowering the potters' community and reviving the dying art of pottery. The potters have been distributed equipment after successfully completing 15-days of training.

The KVIC Chairman said empowering 1650 rural artisan families on Martyr's Day was the biggest tribute to the Father of the Nation as this would go on to strengthen Indian villages. "Gandhi ji was the embodiment of Khadi. For him Khadi was not just a fabric but a tool of self-sustainability. A number of beneficiaries present on the occasion thanked KVIC for supporting rural industries that provided them with sustainable livelihood. Many spinners and weavers said distribution of modern charkha and looms would enhance their productivity significantly and help them earn better livelihood.

Similarly, a potter said with the electric potter wheel he was able to make at least 2000 earthen lamps (deeya) every day which increased his production as well as income by up to 4 times. Many other potters who had given up pottery work owing to hard physical work and financial unviability, have also been benefited by KVIC.

Speaking on the initiatives, the Chairman said that the North East region is now in the focus of KVIC where this sector has tremendous possibilities which will also open up a vista of development in the rural areas of the region where millions of artisans have been weaving dreams of rural reconstructions in Gandhian way. Talking about the growth of Khadi industry in the country Shri Saxena informed that currently KVIC is seeing an average growth of 29% in all over India. Growth of Khadi is helping in creating jobs which is definitely satisfactory, he added. He also informed that many initiatives are being taken up by the Government to increases the production and to reach the difficult areas of the country also.

Lauding Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's commitment for the growth of Khadi industry, Shri Saxena said that to make the traditional industries more productive and competitive and facilitating their sustainable development, the government of India is setting up fund for regeneration of traditional industries. Talking about Kumhar Sashaktikaran Yojana(KSY), an initiative of KVIC for empowerment of communities working in pottery sector in the remotest locations in the country, the Chairman informed that KVIC has created proper marketing channels including tie-up with the Railway for selling the production of potters.

Talking about Honey Mission, Shri Saxena said that the Prime Minister viewed the opportunities and advised the authorities to explore the possibilities to create employment in Tribal regions and backward districts of the country to take up mass honey production as SweetKranti in mission mode.

Dr. Sukumal Deb, Deputy Chief Executive Officer, NEZ Incharge, informed the media about the activities and initiatives of KVIC in the North East Zone.

Shri Duyu Tamo, Member (N.E. Zone), KVIC was also present in the programme.

Crowth OF KHEDIIS robust

On February 13, 2021, Shri Vinai Kumar Saxena, Chairman of Khadi and Village Industries Commission addressed the media in Guwahati.

During his address, the Chairman, KVIC briefed the media about the KVI program being run by KVK across the nation. Especially about such programs which have been prepared keeping in mind the north eastern states.

He informed that the growth of Khadi industries has made a quantum jump from six per cent in 2014 to 29 per cent now. Addressing the media at city hotel on Saturday, Saxena said, "We're approaching various ministries, schools, universities and other to adop khadi. Some of the institutions have accepted our plea. All paramilitary forces will adopt khadi products in their canteens. We've IITs and NITs with us to provide technical support.

"Under the PMEGP 2.28 lakh people have been employed. To make traditional industries more productive and competitive and facilitating their



sustainable development the Centre is setting up a fund for the generation of traditional industries," he said. 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

Guwahati-In his monthly 'Mann Guwahati: Inhismonthly Mann ki Beat', Prime Minister Narendra Medi on Sunday highlighted the revival of 'Mon Shuga' – the thousand year-old traditional, handmade paper of Arumachal Pradesh—used in Buddhist monasteries for religious scriptures. In his radio programme, Modi said: 'For centuries, a type of paper called 'Mon Shuga' is made in this hilly region ('Ilwanga) in Arunachal Pradesh. The locals make this paper from the bark of a tree

this paper from the bark of a tree named Shugu Sheng, hence trees do not have to be cut. Besides, no

named Shugu Sheng, hence trees do not have to be cut. Besides, no chemical is used in the making of this paper. Therefore, it is safe for the environment and health too." He further said: "There was a time when this paper was exported, but with modern techniques, a large amount of paper started getting made and this local art was pushed to the brink of closure. Now, a local social worker, Maling Gombu, has made an effort to rejuvenate this art. This is also giving employment to tribal brothers and sisters there."

Tawang-based advocate and social worker Gombu (47), who had written to the Khadi and Village Industries Commission (KVIC) regarding the dying pepermaking craft of the state, said: "I am extremely proud and hooured that the PM mentioned our small but important "Mon Shugu' in his address."
